DETERMINATION

Pursuant to § 484 of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended (22 U.S.C. 2261) (the "Act"), the International Narcotics Control Corrections Act of 1994, Executive Order 12163, as amended, and State Department Delegation of Authority Number 145, I hereby waive the application of § 484(a)(1) of the Act (which requires that the United States retain title to aircraft made available to a foreign country primarily for narcotics-related purposes), for the sale of eight UH-60L BLACK HAWK helicopters to the Government of Colombia because retention of title to the aircraft would be contrary to the national interest of the United States.

This waiver shall be reported to Congress immediately in accordance with the procedures applicable to reprogramming notifications under § 634A of the Act as required by § 484(a)(2)(ii) of the Act.

POLICY JUSTIFICATION (U)

Bahrain - Continuation of Logistics Support Services and Equipment

The Government of Bahrain has requested a possible sale of continuing logistics support services/equipment for the F-16 aircraft, ALR-69 radar warning receiver, ALQ-131 electric countermeasure pods, radar systems, and engines. The possible sale also includes support equipment, aircraft engine services/modification, repair/return services, depot level repair support; precision measurement equipment laboratory calibration, spare and repair parts, support equipment, supply support, personnel training and training equipment, publications and technical data, contractor technical services and other related elements of logistics support and to ensure aircraft operational availability. The estimated cost is \$150 million.

This proposed sale will contribute to the foreign policy and national security of the United States by helping to improve the security of a friendly country which has been, and continues to be, an important force for political stability and economic progress in the Middle East.

These defense articles and services are required to maintain the operational readiness of the Royal Bahrain Air Force. The Government of Bahrain needs the technical, maintenance, and logistical services to maintain the operational capabilities of its F-16 aircraft radar systems; and engines previously procured from the United States.

This proposed sale will permit Bahrain to order spares, obtain needed repairs and technical guidance on maintaining existing systems, but will not alter the basic military balance in the region.

The principal contractor will be: General Electric Aircraft Engines of Cincinnati, Ohio and Lockheed-Martin Tactical Aircraft Systems of Fort Worth, Texas. There are no known offset agreements proposed in connection with this potential sale.

There will be no new U.S. Government personnel in-country, but currently five contractor representatives have been in-country since 1991.

There will be no adverse impact on U.S. defense readiness as a result of this proposed sale.
